The Bible study (based on 2 Corinthians 4) and discovery process is designed by a group called The Gospel and our Culture Network as part of their research project, but the goals will serve and inform our congregation as well.

Deep and Wide -Worship this Spring. Beginning on Easter Sunday, April 16, and continuing through May 21, we will be bringing together our worship services that have been in two separate spaces – gym and sanctuary. Our hope is that this worship will be both deep in our Lutheran tradition as well as wide in the breadth of styles, music and talent. Throughout this time we will be asking for your input. Feedback forms will be included in the bulletins on those Sundays.

What will change?

- Most of the content of the services will be the same at both 8:30 and 10:45.
- At 10:45 the gym and sanctuary services will be combined in the sanctuary.

Why are we doing this?

- Combining the 10:45 services allows more of our community to celebrate and worship together.
- Our pastors will have increased and more regular contact with those who worship at 10:45.
- This will allow stronger use of our musical talent so that all worship might benefit.

Pastor Rogness on Sabbatical

Pastor Rogness will be on sabbatical May 8 through July 31. He will be reading and writing during this time. A sabbatical policy was included with the call to Pastor Rogness and Pastor Beste, providing three months after every five years of service.

Pastor Rogness began in October of 2000, and Pastor Beste in August of 2001. Pastor Rogness has timed this to best fit with our worship schedule and its staffing, and also before the potential start of building.

Sabbaticals are a time for study, reflection, and renewal. Clergy and parishes benefit through the spiritual and intellectual renewal which results from this time. 1. Stroke Screening/Carotid Artery—This screens the carotid arteries in the neck for plaque buildup. The #1 cause of stroke is linked to carotid artery blockage.

2. Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening—This screens for the existence of an aneurysm in the abdominal aorta. The vast majority of people who have an aneurysm have no symptoms.

3. Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening—This screens for peripheral arterial disease (plaque buildup) in the lower extremities which is linked to coronary artery disease.

Commentary on 2006 Planning Budget – Adjustments made since annual meeting

Line Number refers to the line on the 2006 Planning Budget on the previous page

Line #A Cash Balance from previous year is separated out and shown above the annual budget. This figure is \$8,176 less than appeared in the annual report, reflecting the transfer of funds for Building a Spiritual House (BASH) that did not occur until 2006.

Line #1 “Envelope” giving is based on roughly 90% estimates of giving submitted by members for 2006, and 10% on giving patterns where no estimate of giving was submitted. This figure does not include the \$12,500 prepayment that was included in the 2005 annual report. This figure is almost the same as the annual report because a) a number of households increased their estimate since the annual meeting, b) there have been 4 new pledges, and c) a very careful review of household giving discovered 10 households had not been factored into the annual report figure.

Line #3 Thanks to DNR Construction, Abbey Flooring, Halvor Nelson, (& for smoke detectors, Halvor, Dick Jacobson, Tom Frantz), the wall in NW part of building was completed and room created for Lakeridge to move from the house – a move that was made on March 17 and 18, 2006. Thus, this year’s estimate of income for “building use” is accurate and up to date.

Line #3 We are negotiating with People Inc., a not-for-profit ministry that works with people with disabilities, for them to use the annex at a lower-than-market-value rate for their ministry. This would allow us to keep the annex off the tax rolls, while supporting this non-profit ministry, and it would generate some income for the use of the house. However, we are not showing that as income for 2006 at this time. There is a possibility that this arrangement could begin by the end of the summer.

Line #19 \$6,100 has been reduced from Program Budgets – using last year’s actual expenditures as the basis for the 2006 Planning Budget.

Line #20-23. The Benevolence Giving is held at the 2005 level of 10.1%. We are committed to faithful budgeting that begins with a tithe.

Line #34 The Annex (house) Tax payable in this year’s budget is now at \$5,510 – the full amount for 2006. The tax is for the year 2005. We have vacated the annex prior to June, so there will be no taxes charged us for in 2006, payable in 2007.

* Regarding BASH funds’ transfers and cash flow – the Council has instituted a policy that allows the use of non-designated gifts for cash flow purposes. On March 9, funds designated for BASH, have been transferred into our Vanguard Money Market account so they can earn full interest until they are drawn on for their intended purpose. The “BASH transfer” (due to electronic giving) that appeared in the annual report has since been taken from end-of-year cash balance and does not show on this report.

* Lakeridge Daycare is moving forward with plans to expand their program into the downstairs area at the beginning of September. At that time, we will have increased our capacity for ministry to children, and increased our funding base above the level from when Tomorrow’s Kids was a tenant.



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PoP Habitat for Humanity

Our work days have been scheduled for 2006. We need to find 5 people for April 17 and 18, and 6 people every day for the week of May 15-19.

This is a rehab project rather than a new build, so it will give us a chance to do some new tasks. Site is located on Goodrich Ave in St. Paul (SE of Excel Center). The April days will be demolition (can be very emotionally satisfying) and the May week likely a mixture of tearing down and building up.
